>Summer Learning

What research says about summer learning:

When the school year ends, children in high-poverty environments struggle not only with basic needs like healthy food and safe places to spend their days, but with losing precious time during the summer months to continue their learning. The cumulative effect is a crisis in the making: by the fifth grade, summer learning loss can leave low-income students two-and-a-half to three years behind their peers.

Below is a sampling of what districts/communities are offering. (Share this with others who may be concerned.)

(1) Credit retrieval/remediation

Summer School is for students who were not promoted to the next grade after finishing the regular school year. Students attending Summer School receive additional instruction to prepare them for the next school year through engaging reading and math curriculum, and participating in field trips to cultural sites across the city. Students also receive a free, healthy breakfast and lunch every day.

(2) Skill building

K5+ is a 25-day summer program for students at high-need schools that emphasize literacy, math, art, music, science literacy and social skills. Students who take advantage of the 25 bonus instructional days have more time to devote to studies that can greatly benefit them in the years ahead. The program's purpose is to help narrow the achievement gap between disadvantaged students and other students. It also aims to increase cognitive skills, help improve test scores and provide summer enrichment experiences.

(3) Enrichment learning

Thousands of students can get an exciting and enriching academic experience this summer, all for FREE in a safe and fun school setting! Since 2017, nearly 15,000 elementary students have attended the annual SCS Summer Learning Academy. This, year's programs will be offered at 40 schools across the District for students in elementary and middle school. Students get a full day of stimulating literacy, math and STEM lessons and activities, as well as music, arts, sports and other recreation. Plus, with a growing list of community partners, students get to take awesome summer field trips. Our "Kickoff to Kindergarten" program features hands-on learning to promote school readiness for rising Kindergarteners. All meals are FREE, too! In addition to providing a safe, fun and enriching summer experience for students, the Summer Learning Academy was created to prevent students from losing ground over the summer – also commonly known as summer slide. Students in the Summer Learning Academy consistently show growth in reading, overall literacy and math.

(4) Career options/internships

CareerCLUE provides high school students the chance to gain valuable work experience and get paid during the summer. Students enrolled in the program will receive a Summer Youth Employment Program summer stipend of up to \$700 and can also earn an elective credit. Students will visit some of NYC’s leading employers to learn about different careers and also participate in hands-on science, engineering, and art projects throughout the summer.

HIRE LA’s Youth is one of the City’s most exciting programs to put young adults to work, ensuring they have “first time” job experience that will set them on the path of lifetime earners. This year we are committed to providing 15,000 jobs for young people ages 14 to 24 who live in the city of Los Angeles. Mayor Eric Garcetti has set a goal of 20,000 jobs by 2020, whether it’s a summer internship or year-round, full-time employment. Through the HIRE LA’s Youth initiative, the City of LA partners with employers to help fill those positions. Youth are required to work at least 100 hours and receive workforce training before they arrive on the first day.

In the news: Carol Dweck, author of “growth mindset” says educators have misused the concept.

Carol Dweck has become the closest thing to an education celebrity because of her work on growth mindset. Her research shows that children who have a growth mindset welcome challenges as opportunities to improve, believing that their abilities can change with focused effort. Kids with fixed mindsets, on the other hand, believe they have a finite amount of talent that can't be altered and shy away from challenges that might reveal their inabilities.

Dweck believes educators flocked to her work because many were tired of drilling kids for high-stakes tests and recognized that student motivation and love for learning was being lost in the process. But Dweck is worried that as her research became more popular, many people oversimplified its message.

In an interview ... she described all the ways she sees growth mindset being misappropriated. She says often teachers and parents aren't willing to take the longer, more difficult path of helping students identify strategies and connect success to those strategies. Instead, her complicated psychological research has gotten boiled down to, "praise the effort, not the outcome." Dweck also explained what she means by a "false" growth mindset....

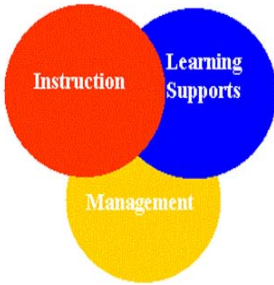
