Many schools now require students to perform a certain number of volunteer hours as a condition of graduation. Many nonprofit organizations have need, sometimes daily, for competent office help, usually filing, photocopying, answering phones, etc. You may wish to call some of the organizations mentioned below and find out what type of volunteer opportunities they have. ...

For high school community service programs to have a positive impact on subsequent civic engagement, students must volunteer in a sustained manner and must evaluate their volunteering experiences positively... With respect to the general sense of responsibility, students drew links between volunteering and “healthy” societies ...

>I’ve been to places where the neighborhood and everyone did volunteer and do stuff, and it’s just a better feeling. Everyone is closer and everyone kind of watches out for each other. And then I’ve lived in neighborhoods where everyone lives really separate. You don’t even know your neighbors.

>If you do live there and if you are taking things from the community you should also give back, so I think that in a way it’s a responsibility to people to look out for other people and improve the community and make sure that everyone who is living in the community is seeing the benefits...

Community service is often organized through a local group, such as a place of worship, school, or non-profit organization, or you can start your own community service projects...
