


- Alabama State Department of Education (ALSDE) adopted the Learning Supports initiative in 2012. Alabama's Plan 2020 – Support Systems
- Leading the charge in Alabama is Dr. Linda Felton-Smith Director of the Office of Learning Support
- Partnership with Scholastic and the UCLA team of Dr. Howard Adelman and Dr. Linda Taylor
- Learning Supports is in year three of implementation.
- Goal is to have statewide implementation in 5 years.



Learning Supports are defined as the resources, strategies, and practices that support physical, social, emotional, and intellectual development and well-being to enable all students to have an equal opportunity for success at school.

- A system that addresses barriers to learning and teaching and re-engages disconnected students.
- A system that is fully integrated with *instructional efforts* and *interventions* and *professional development*.
- A system that embraces a *three-component framework* instruction management – learning supports.
- A system that is a *continuum of interventions* that promotes school and community resources working together.

Partnership with Gateway - Year Two

Buy-in from all stakeholder groups – Student, Parent, Teacher, Staff

13-14 SY – 24 schools served, approximately 50 students, 262 sessions provided

14-15 SY – 114 referrals, approximately 60 students, 40 parents did not follow through

Targeted intervention with students at New Direction

Assessing Effectiveness – Risk Assessments went from 117 to 55

Work with Chilton-Shelby Mental Health – Juvenile Court and Department of Human Resources






