UPDATE #2 - California Initiative New Directions for Student Support - 6/21/04

Hope you all have had a successful school year and can use some of the upcoming summer to restore your energy and enthusiasm for the important work at hand.

Here is a brief update on the work to date and an invitation for you to participate as the work moves forward.

As you know, the **CA Steering Group for New Directions for Student Support** endorsed the creation of two workgroups(a) one focused on information sharing and (b) the other on identifying school districts that are ready to move and enhancing decision maker interest in New Directions for Student Support. These are up and running (and invite anyone to join in).

**A.** Information Sharing. On 6/2/04 we sent an email invitation to all who attended or were interested in attending the February, 2003, California Summit on New Directions for Student Support to join in **launching a campaign to inform a broad range of partners about the imperative for new directions**. There were 28 responses. >>Initial responses have included some indicating quite a bit of optimism, those with less optimism, and others who clearly are not ready for new directions. Ten districts have been identified for us to contact to see if there is a way to help them as they try to move forward.

Here is a sample of comments from initial responders

>"We are moving in this direction in our district. Our KEY leaders are very interested."
>"We are interested in improving the learning environment for children, but the problem is in the details. Before anyone can make a commitment we need an action plan."
>"We are somewhat ready. My problem is that we are transitioning a new person into a key position and this new person will need a little time to settle in."
>"Our district is on stall because we've just hired a new superintendent and are in the process of looking for a new Director of Student Support Services."
>"My district is far from ready on all three issues. Unfortunately there has been a

massive turnover of staff at the top and in the middle of leadership in the district, and that is the primary reason for the timing of the initiative to miss our district. However, as opportunities present themselves, I will let you know."

We will follow up with each district responding to see what next steps can be taken.
