- 5) What will it cost?

B. The Second Workgroup --

This group is concerned with clarifying how to identify school districts that are ready to move and enhancing decision maker interest in new directions for student support. Specifically, the group is focused on delineating what criteria to use in determining readiness, who to contact for nominations, and how to engage decision makers.

Cathlin Gray, Assistant Superintendent, Evansville Vanderburgh School Corporation, will help lead this group. As she points out, "Those who are doing some work in this area need to be brought together and supported. Success breeds success and we all learn from each others. These cheerleaders will be the ones who can help support the Social Marketing workgroup understand exactly what it is that needs to be marketed and probably have some pretty good ideas about how to do that and who they would like to see at the table who has the leverage in the state to move this process forward." (After the workgroup provides their input, Center staff will synthesize what has been decided and send it to all the Indiana summit participants and interested parties for their feedback, additional ideas, nominations of sites, etc.)
