Legislation to move school improvement policy to a three component approach

Over the next few months, our Center at UCLA will be contacting legislators in every state about reframing school improvement policy to move from a two to a three component framework.

Specifically: Drawing from the Center's work over many years (as presented in two recent books,*) we will send key legislators three brief documents:

- The first will clarify why it is essential to enact policy that makes addressing barriers to learning and teaching the third primary, cohesive, and essential component of school improvement policy (along with the components for instruction and management/governance).
- The second will offer a prototype guide for developing the third component over several years into a unified, comprehensive, and equitable system of learning supports that is sustainable and replicable to scale across a district.
- The third will be an adaptable prototype of a state legislative bill for improving school improvement.
